TWIN-CAM TR-3'S SET FOR 24-HOUR GRIND

Three special experimental versions of the TR-3 will compete in the 24-hour race at Le Mans, France on June 20-21. The famous endurance race, run for the first time in 1923, is over an 8.37 mile circuit, one of the fastest in Europe. At 4 PM on Saturday the 20th, the drivers will run to their cars in the traditional "Le Mans start" and the race will be on. The checkered flag falls at 4 PM on Sunday.

The model designation of the special Triumphs entered is TR-3S. They are powered by a twin overhead camshaft engine giving 150 brake horsepower and will have a wheelbase 6" longer than the present model.

Team drivers are: Ninian Sanderson — J. Stoop, Peter Jopp — Calude DuBois, and Peter Bolton — Mike Rothschild. Ninian Sanderson was the winner at Le Mans in 1956.

Mike Rothschild, of Kearney, New Jersey, drove a TR-3 in the Sebring races in 1957 and 1958 and was chosen for the factory team on the basis of his fine record in the difficult 12-hour Sebring Grand Prix of Endurance

The TR-3S will not be put into production or sold to the public until a successful development period has

been achieved. When it is offered to the public, it will not replace the existing TR-3 but will be an addition to the line at a higher price.

The concours is, of course, an automotive beauty contest, usually reserved for sports cars and antiques or classics. All cars are judged on cleanliness and general condition under such categories as chrome, paint, top, wheels and tires, instruments, upholstery, etc. The engine compartment, usually the dirtiest part of any car, must be spotless in order for the car to qualify.

This sort of event requires the full participation of club members, since a number of teams of judges are needed in order to make the consideration of each car as fair as possible. It is also an excellent publicity-getter for club and dealer alike . . . a dealer in a local club area should be more than happy to provide the space for the contest. The NITSOA celebrated their first anniversary by holding a "Super Gymkhana" on the new Meadowdale Raceway, Carpentersville, Ill. April 19 was the date and 61 cars registered for the run. 25 TR's were present, two of which ended up in the top ten finishers.

The gymkhana utilized the entire 3.3 mile track and consisted of a continuous run through 13 checkpoints around the track, starting with a 1/5th mile acceleration run and continuing through obstacles such as a slalom, an island, a maze, and mock railroad tracks, all formed by hay bales. Finally, there was a run up the "Monza Wall" a steeply banked turn on the course and a backing test down the wall and into a garage. Despite the difficulty of setting up and controlling such an event, favorable comments were heard from all about the safety provisions, officiating and just plain fun.

The NITSOA is the first small group in their area to attempt such a large-scale event and they have gained tremendous publicity and a fine reputation as a result.

The D.C. TSOA Newsletter runs to three pages in the May issue and is crammed with information and interesting articles. A special feature for new members is the club history. The exceptional brakes took a terrific strain but never showed the slightest tendency to fade or overheat, even when driving in heavy stop and go traffic in Washington, D. C. I used no oil." REAR END RATIOS: Some TSOA members have been inquiring as to how to determine the rear end ratio of their cars. This can be done easily by getting under the car and looking at the cover plate on the differential housing. The 3.7 gears will be indicated by a splash of green paint on the housing. The 4.1 gears will be indicated by splashes of green and white.
