

TR-3 AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL RALLY TEAM TAKES 5 AWARDS

TRIUMPH BESTS ALL FOREIGN TEAMS

The Standard-Triumph TR-3 team was awarded five trophies in the final results of the American International Rally. They received the Best Foreign Manufacturer's Entry trophy, the Ladies' Prize, 3rd in the 1600-2000 cc Class, 7th Overall and Best New York Starter.

On the night of October 13th, the personnel of 13 cars, their various well-wishers and factory representatives, the press and a curious crowd, all probably regretted the choice of New York as a starting point in the American International Rally. The wind whistles past Sardi's West on 44th Street at bone-chilling speed, especially at three AM, and during the long intervals between starts (last car left at 4:20), Sardi's did a roaring business in coffee, etc., with emphasis, for once, on the coffee.

At 3:02, the first TR-3 started, driven by Denise McCluggage and navigated by Eleanor Halmi. Twenty minutes later, #22 with Bob Halmi at the wheel was off, Lou Batori already making calculations. #42 with Walter Cronkite/Stu Blodgett and #62 with Doug Kennedy/Alex Thompson, followed at similar intervals. 62 was the last New York car to start and the freezing crowd went home to bed.

The finish of Leg One, at Asheville, North Carolina, saw all four Triumphs running well and dead accurate on time. A fast check of fuel, water and oil and they were off . . . destination, Fort Smith, Arkansas. On the way, bad weather hit hard and, in the middle of fog and rain, #42 slid off the road into a lake near Cleveland, Tennessee, turning over twice and landing in several feet of

water. Cronkite and Blodgett were unhurt and immediately set about getting their wheels back on the ground. Once towed out, the car was found to be driveable, but water and silt had damaged the car to the extent that they were forced to give up.

Meanwhile, the ladies' entry bored on through the same fog and rounded a bend only to see a dog on the road. Off onto the shoulder they went, missing the animal. When they pulled back onto the road, a fast-moving car rounded the same bend and crashed into the rear of the TR-3. No one hurt, but they had collected 100 penalty points and two very stiff necks! There were no further incidents and the three remaining Triumphs entered Fort Smith unpenalized except for the accident points and prepared for Leg Number Three to Santa Fe.

Santa Fe, where there was a 1-day layover, was reached unpenalized and the male crews headed for the sack. The girls took off for the local hospital for a much needed neck massage. Friday evening, October 16, would be the start of the really hard part of the rally. The cars were proven reliable . . . now the navigator and driver's skills would be called on heavily for the Regularity section from Santa Fe to Las Vegas.

Triumph stood tall in the winner's circle at the Red Leaf Sports Car Rally held in Jamestown, New York on October 12. There were 184 cars entered in the event, 36 of them Triumphs. The crack partnership of Bill Greehey and Stewart Epley drove away with the first overall trophy at the Bella Vista Rally held in Centerport, L. I., New York, on October 25th. Their victory represented an 11 second error 130 other cars, please!

SERVICE

Following last month's Winter Service article, several members wrote in to inquire why we stated that American-made thermostats should not be used. The answer to this is that the American units do not provide for closing off the bypass to the radiator, thus preventing correct flow of water. Therefore, you should use only the original-equipment thermostat, part #107590, or the high-temperature unit, part #101956.


- 2. At sign "Speed Limit 60 Night 55".... Change Speed to 54.3 MPH


